Have you heard?

The United States government is issuing currency with new designs and security features beginning with the \$20 note in late 2003. New designs for the \$50 and \$100 notes will follow in 2004 and 2005. The new \$20 design retains three of the most important security features that were first introduced in the 1990s and are easy to check: a **watermark**, **security thread** and **color-shifting ink**.



Agent Banks



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Color-Shifting Ink

Tilt the note up and down, and you'll see the number "20" in the lower right corner change color from copper to green. This is the color-shifting ink.



Agent Cash

Security Thread

Hold the bill up to the light and look for the security thread that is embedded in the paper and runs vertically up one side of the note. If you look closely, the words "USA TWENTY" are visible along the thread.

Watermark

Hold the bill up to the light, and look for the watermark or faint image, similar to the large portrait. The watermark can be seen from both sides of the note.
